Filipino One of the most colorful festivals of the Philippines, the Ati-Atihan festival recognizes the peace pact between the Ati of Panay and the Malays, who were early migrants to the Philippines. During this festival, the townspeople dress up in colorful and bizarre costumes, blacken their bodies with soot, and sing and dance in the streets. Lunar New Year's Eve Jan 31 (not fixed) Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, & Others In the days prior to the beginning of the Lunar New Year, many preparations are made. People clean and decorate their homes, offerings and prayers are made to various gods including the Kitchen God, and a special New Year's eve family reunion meal is held.
